Brynn & Mia

I recently received an e-mail about new puppies that needed a foster home and immediately had a flash back to an urgent e-mail from November 2009. That was the day my life changed, for the better of course! Nothing

has been as life altering as raising Brynn and Mia from the time they were only 4 days old, but sometimes I feel like I failed as a foster parent. I didn't fail them because I kept them alive, warm and happy, but I feel like I didn't do my job as a foster parent because I didn't complete my job - I never gave them back!

Every time I arrive home I think how different my life would be if I didn't have their happy smiling faces to come home to (and they do smile, a lot!). I feel they are a part of me, as much as the blood in my veins. From bottles to puppy mush to soaking kibble, I did my best to keep them healthy and safe, even though I had to get up at three in the morning to mix their formula and keep it warm.

There are stories as to why I picked each of them from the 10 that needed fosters - Mia, because she was the loudest and if her voice was any indication, she would make it; Brynn, because she drank her bottle down faster and with more verve than I thought possible for a four day old pup; And I picked Jackson because he made me a little sad and I thought I could fix him. I was wrong. Nothing I could have done would have saved him, and I cried for hours knowing that. I just couldn't save him. Many things about them made me cry actually, and some still do. I cried when I thought Mia wasn't eating enough and when Brynn had trouble walking. I cried in frustration when they just would not go back to sleep. I cry now because Brynn is clumsy and hurts herself and because Mia is so stubborn and refuses to walk nicely on her leash. And I still cry because I cannot believe that someone would ever do that to innocent animals – put them in a sack and dump them out of a car.

But no matter how much I cry or scream in frustration, nothing outweighs the joy they bring me. I remember the first time I saw Mia's eyes. They were the brightest blue I had ever seen and it scared me a little bit to know that something really was going on inside of that tiny body, and that it was bigger than anything I had ever seen before. I remember the first time I gave Brynn a bath. I was terrified that she would catch a chill, but I still laugh at the way she squealed and wiggled in the warm water. Mia's tongue never seemed to quite fit in her mouth, giving her a look of utterly cute defiance in everything she did. Their first time outside was as exciting for me as it was for them, and when they came back

looking so proud of themselves for catching their first leaves, you couldn't have found a prouder mom. I've even been known to give a silent, and extremely grudging, thanks to whoever thought they weren't worth keeping, because it means that they were stupid enough to let go of some of the most precious things on earth and give them to me.

People always ask me two things. First they ask if hand-raised pups are different from dogs raised by a real mother. I always have the same answer for them. A resounding YES! My dogs don't think that they're dogs. They don't fetch like normal dogs; they pounce and bat their toys around like a cat. They don't play with each other like normal dogs; they poke and push at each other with their paws like little kids on a playground. After I explain all of this to whoever happens to inquire, their second question is normally about how much easier it must be to raise and train two pups instead of just one because they can learn together. Nope! Not so! No way! No how! They are constantly distracting each other and wanting to play together. I thought that they would never be house broken because whenever we would take them outside they would find a rock or stick or piece of leaf and taunt the other with it. It got so bad that we had to take them outside separately, and sometimes we still do! Having two at the same time is something that just happened; it wasn't planned and it's something that I recommend only to the most highly experienced owners, no newbies allowed.

I'm not sure why I needed to write this down as I've never told anyone even half of it. I guess it's because when I got the e-mail, I could only see my babies. There was limited information in the e-mail, so my brain automatically filled in the missing info with my dogs' story. Even though it's highly unlikely that these new pups are from a large litter of Shepherds who were dropped in a bag on the side of the road too, that's what my head keeps saying, and my heart just keeps breaking at the thought. I know

that I couldn't take these babies into my home as well because of my job and the two big, goofy idiot half-pups, and my two already highly-offended cats, but that doesn't mean that they won't be in my heart with every other furry wonder that the Humane Society looks after.

With an increase in animals coming through our doors this year, we have been full most of the summer and are still at capacity and always looking for more space to help out as many animals as we can. Our volunteers have worked very hard through a very busy season. Those who have helped in feeding and cleaning the many cages and kennels have been such a great help to our animal care worker. Litters of puppies and kittens keep us hopping and we no sooner get them cleaned and fed and 5 minutes later they need to be done again. It is great fun to have them with us but it does make for some busy shifts when we are full. Thanks to all those who provide feeding and cleaning for the cats, kittens, dogs and puppies. It is easily the most important job in the shelter as it is imperative for healthy animals. Our dog walkers have been great, coming faithfully to walk the dogs and help with the puppies. The reception volunteers have been a great help, keeping the adoptions desk organized and patiently showing families through, answering questions and helping them to adopt.

A big thank you to Mary Anne Edwards and Leigh Anna Brown for their work as adoption counsellors. These two ladies have worked very hard to keep adoptions moving forward and finding great homes for many of our animals. Sally Fund

A year ago, the Sally Fund was set up as a very specific charitable fund within the Burlington Humane Society. Its sole purpose is to cover medical costs of homeless dogs from Southern Ontario that are either suffering from heartworm, fractures, wounds, malnutrition and even cases of abuse. Neglect of animals is not something that is generally found in Burlington, but in other parts of Ontario the animals are not as lucky.

The fund is named for "Sally", one of these dogs, who suffered from heartworm. Treatment for heartworm includes several painful injections at monthly intervals.

With the help of the "Sally Fund", Burlington Humane has saved 23 dogs, providing deworming, antibiotics, pain medication and vaccinations and spay/neuter. There are currently six dogs still in various stages of treatment, and three who have just arrived and two are in need of foster homes. Thanks to all those who have fostered these dogs over the past year – it can take months to complete treatment, depending on the severity of the condition. If you have room in your home for a foster dog for a few months, please contact us.

The Sally Fund does not discriminate against medical conditions. As you can imagine, some conditions can be costly to treat. Foster parents donate their time, home, patience, and most importantly, love. Veterinarians donate their professional time.

Luckily for many of these dogs, they are adopted to their forever homes within days of arriving at BHS after completion of their treatment.

Would you please consider donating to this cause and save a life!



Rocky – 12 wk old

Rocky has already suffered a setback in his short life. Barely old enough to be separated from his mother or his litter mates, Rocky was found as a stray and surrendered to a veterinary clinic. At the time he was surrendered his face was swollen on the left side. The swelling increased severely causing his left eye to swell shut. At first it was thought that he may have been hit

by a car. Upon further examination the veterinarian determined that the cause of the swelling was a puncture wound in the roof of his mouth. The puncture had pierced the pallet and entered his sinuses. Due to this opening, Rocky breathes through his mouth and is unable to move air easily through his nose.

Rocky is currently in foster care and much improved. The swelling has disappeared and his eye has completely opened. The puncture wound is healing but it will take time close completely. Hopefully once the puncture has healed he will be able to breathe normally. Rocky will be looking for his forever home soon.

Gracie came to BHS very shy and nervous; cautious but sweet and gentle once she learned to trust. A wonderful foster home came forward to take Gracie in and provide a safe, warm place for her - and her 10 puppies! Mom and pups are doing well with their foster family and will be up for adoption in mid-Dec.. This sweet little

girl's future was bleak until a few kind people and a determined vet decided that she was not a throw away animal but one worth saving and she will soon find her forever home with someone who will love and care for her the way she deserves.
