The Gift of Sight

Burlington Humane Clooney was neutered, vaccinated, dewormed and behaviour tested. We thought he was ready for his new home...but we were very wrong.

About to be put up for adoption it was noticed that Clooney's eyes were a bit cloudy. Clooney was checked over by our shelter vet, who recognized mild cataracts forming in both eyes. He was sent to Mississauga Oakville Veterinary Emergency Clinic to see an eye specialist in order to confirm our shelter vet's diagnosis and to determine the severity of the ocular disease.

Unfortunately, after three appointments with two different specialists it was confirmed that his cataracts are rapidly progressing and Clooney is steadily losing his vision. Sadly the specialists have also confirmed more recently that there are some concerns with both his retinas.

At his foster home and on his walks he is now bumping into walls and objects. He requires daily eye medications to help

ease the swelling in his eyes.

Clooney is a very special case here at Burlington Humane. His care is on -going as we attempt to determine the best course of action for this brave boy. He will most likely see yet another eye specialist in the upcoming months. Until then, Clooney will spend his time playing with his husky foster sister Myia (seen below on the right) and hiking along the Grand River.

Luckily Clooney, his foster family and Burlington Humane remain optimistic.

Clooney's special medical treatment is being paid for with Sally Fund donations. This fund is used to pay for extraordinary medical expenses for dogs.

Another year is almost over and it is time to reflect on the past few very busy months and think about New Year resolutions! We are so grateful for our hardworking staff and our dedicated volunteers, many of whom have recently worked over-time with the full-house of animals in our care. The July through December months find the shelter full of animals and busy with activities before the holiday season.

We welcomed Mary Anne Edwards to the Board of Directors at our AGM in June. Mary Anne brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the board learned over 18 years first as a volunteer and then as an adoption counsellor.

Congratulations to Shelter Manager Adrienne Gosse and Alex Maranduik who were married during their October holiday in Cuba!

I want to thank all of you for all your good wishes after my surgery in June. It meant a lot knowing I was bestowed so many positive thoughts and feel it contributed to my quick recovery. I haven't felt so good in many years even though I still have some physical limitations.

Earlier this year, the board agreed to run a trial and have all kittens spayed or neutered before being adopted. After several months we decided to end the trial. Most Burlington veterinarians will not perform pediatric spay/neuters because of the increased risk of complications, including death, which we did experience. It also meant that kittens had to reach a certain weight, which many did not achieve until they were 10 or more weeks old, missing those weeks at home and being in a cage longer.

In place now, all adopters of kittens are given a coupon for a free spay/neuter at their choice of participating Burlington veterinarian clinics. This must be done before the kitten is 6 months old. An adopter now has the opportunity to enjoy those early kitten weeks and all the fun and antics that go with it! This has been very popular with adopters.

I'm sure some of you have noticed we did not send out a fall newsletter. We felt with the increase in the price of postage it was not feasible to continue with mailing out three newsletters each year. We use social media to communicate almost daily, although I realize everyone does not have the option of receiving these updates.

January always brings a slowdown in animals arriving at the shelter, but no less work as that is the time for review and upgrade procedures. Veterinary

- Holly can cause intense vomiting, diarrhea and depression.
- **Mistletoe**, another Christmas plant, can cause significant vomiting and diarrhea, difficulty breathing, collapse, erratic behaviour, hallucinations and death when ingested.
- Lilies which are commonly found in holiday arrangements can be deadly to cats.

The Story of Marbles

When Burlington Humane rescued Marbles on June 10th he was in grave condition. He was found wandering by some apartment buildings, lost and severely injured. Was he hit by a car or did he fall from a balcony? These are just some of the questions we will never have answers for because no one came forward to claim him.



Burlington Humane took immediate action and made sure Marbles had the medical attention he desperately needed at the Burgess Veterinary Emergency Hospital. X-Rays, bloodwork, and pain meds were some of the first treatments given to this injured kitty. His injuries included a jaw broken in two places, a split upper palate several broken teeth, chest trauma, and a fractured toe. Marbles was in so much discomfort and pain that he shied away from human contact and obviously had a difficult time eating any food. After being examined by a dental specialist, it was determined that most of his injuries could not

heal on their own. He was transported to the Mississauga-Oakville Veterinary Emergency Hospital where he underwent extensive oral surgery. Stabilizers were put in his mouth so it would have a chance to heal properly. At this time not all his broken teeth could be removed because they were actually continuing to help stabilize the jaw. After many months Marbles went back for a second surgery where he had the remainder of his broken teeth and his stabilizers removed. He spent many months with his foster mom recovering from his surgeries and re-learning how to eat. Marbles is just one of the



many miracle cats Burlington Humane has the honour of helping each year. These cases are never easy, but with the help of our wonderful donors, we know that Marbles will one day find a loving home. He is a true survivor and now ready for his forever home.

One of the hardest parts about adopting an animal is knowing when your friend is ready to pass on. It is one of the most heart-wrenching and unselfish decisions you will ever make.

When my cat, Moon, was diagnosed with diabetes, insulin injections every 12 hours and a strict diet kept her healthy for 4 more great years. However, over the last few months she stopped responding to her name as her hearing dulled, and her vision became cloudier. Then she stopped grooming herself or jumping on to the couch for cuddles. She spent most of the day in her cat bed as her quality of life deteriorated to a point where I believe she was no longer happy. I knew, as her friend and caregiver, it was time to let her go.

Moon was timid, and always cried when she was in a carrier. She was never comfortable anywhere but home. For this reason I didn't want her to be in a strange place when we let her go, so I looked for a mobile vet to perform an in-home euthanasia.

The vet came to our house and agreed with me that it was time to let Moon be at peace. She lay comfortably in her favourite spot, while the procedure took place. Moon was never afraid or in pain as she lay in her bed, with me by her side.

As I lifted her from her bed and held her in my arms one last time before the vet took her away, I knew I had done exactly what Moon needed. She had passed so peacefully, without any fear or anxiety. As difficult as it was, I was able to make the tough decision that was best for my sweet girl.

For the Chocolate Lover

Late August a woman came into the shelter with a cardboard box. In that box there were three 4 week old male kittens. All three kittens were very sick with serious eye infections., upper respiratory infections and were dehydrated, underweight and anemic from fleas. Fearing the worse for these listless babies, shelter staff immediately sent them to Burgess Veterinary Emergency Clinic for care. Because they were so sweet they were named

Snickers, Rolo and Smarties. This chocolate trio stayed at Burgess for two weeks getting the medical care they needed such as fluids, flea treatment, dewormers, antibiotics and eve drops every few hours. Their care continued in our isolation room for many weeks after being stable enough to come over to BHS. Our shelter vet placed them



all on additional eye medications and kept a very close watch as these three began to grow up and become a tumbling mass of trouble as they spent most of their time wrestling with one another! We are happy to announce that all three kittens recovered!



Although they all had varying degrees of corneal scarring, they all retained their vision and were adopted by amazing families!

BHS Shelter Animals—Did you know?

Have you ever wondered what the process is for putting a stray animal up for adoption?

To help keep all of our cats and dogs healthy and happy, all stray animals are first taken to a vet clinic. There they will be looked over by a veterinarian, and given any help they need. Whether it's food, medications, fluids for any dehydrated animals, or even an emergency surgery. Our local clinics do what's best for every animal brought in. Burlington Humane will also advertise all found animals in 2 local newspapers and on some websites too!

If an animal is not claimed by an owner, BHS will make sure all these animals are spayed or neutered, vaccinated, microchipped and dewormed. Some animals require more medical care, and dentals,

bloodwork and urinalysis are not uncommon for some of our older guys. Once space is available at BHS, a period that can take a few days up to many weeks depending on the time of year, they come to the shelter and go up for adoption! Dogs require a few more steps as their temperament is assessed and sometimes a dog trainer is consulted before they go up for adoption.
