Executive Director's Report

With the passing of summer and the return to school, work and schedules, Burlington Humane is also getting back into the Fall routine. This summer we had the usual influx of mother cats and kittens. Although kitten season is predictable, this past season seemed busier than in previous years. It was especially eye opening for many of our staff, who were experiencing kitten season for the first time. This time of year demands flexibility with our staff to help out where needed. We have made an effort to cross train our staff so that they are able to help in areas other than their main focus. We could also not have survived it without the caring and dedication of our foster parents. Many took in expectant mother cats and fostered them until the kittens were born, ensured they were healthy, weaned and ready to be adopted. Other foster parents went above and beyond when they needed to hand feed their foster kittens. To help them out, we held foster workshops. Our first topic was on hand feeding as that was where we had an immediate need.

We also established a Foster group on our Facebook page, where we can better communicate and share stories and experiences with our foster parents and they can share experiences with each other. Occasionally

foster parents can feel alone and isolated as they do not always need to come to Burlington Humane, so being able to communicate with BHS and other fosters on Facebook has been a real blessing for some.



Once again our volunteers came to our rescue when many more were needed during critical feeding and cleaning times. With full cat rooms and often two cats to a cage, the time needed to take care of all those animals increased. With volunteers heading away on vacation, we have needed to continue training new volunteers. Thankfully the community has been very gracious with their time and new volunteers have been signing up. Our preference is always to have volunteers who can offer a long term commitments and become volunteers that we can rely on for years to come.

We have also been working a lot with the various dogs that have joined us. We have been spending time training the dogs so that they are much easier to adopt. This has decreased their time at Burlington Humane significantly and the training has proven to be a worthwhile investment.

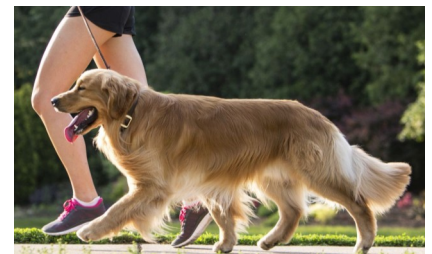

Rabies in Ontario

Controlling rabies is a constant endeavor in Southern Ontario. Rabies is a virus that can be passed on from one animal to the next through bites that break the skin, infected saliva in open wounds and mouth, nose or eyes. Rabies is very serious as it is often fatal and can be passed on to people. Signs that an animal has rabies include aggression, frothing at the mouth, partial paralysis and excessive drooling. Amongst wildlife, the animals most commonly found to have rabies are raccoons, bats and skunks.

Because Rabies is so serious, all cats and dogs must be vaccinated against rabies by law. Burlington Humane is heeding this warning and

is holding a Microchip and Rabies Clinic this fall. Watch the Burlington Humane website for the exact date so that you can bring your pet and it will be protected from rabies for \$25.00. This is a fraction of the cost of a rabies vaccine from your veterinarian. It is imperative that all animals are protected against rabies and have a microchip. Do your part as a responsible pet owner. Plan on participating in Burlington Humane's Rabies and Microchip clinic coming this fall. At the same event, your pet can also receive a microchip to assist in their faster return to you should they be lost.

Leave a Legacy

Animals and Canadian law

Animals in Canada have become a lot more protected now that three bills have become law. Bill S-203, Ending the Captivity of Whales and Dolphins Act; Bill C-84, An Act to Amend the Criminal Code pertaining to Bestiality and Animal Fighting; and Bill C-68, banning shark finning are now law.

Bill S-203 prohibits the taking of whales and dolphins into captivity and prohibits their import into Canada and their export from Canada. This is a critical fact as Marineland in Ontario holds more than 50 beluga whales for breeding and trading purposes.

Many justify the confinement of Whales and Dolphins by arguing the benefits of research and public education. However the type of research that can be done in captivity is limited. Jacques Cousteau, the famous marine explorer, once said, "There is about as much educational benefit to be gained in studying dolphins in captivity as there would be studying mankind by only observing prisoners held in solitary confinement."

A second important bill that has just become law is Bill C-84 where the definition of bestiality has been broadened and animal fighting has been made illegal. The definition of bestiality now includes any sexual contact involving an animal. Studies have shown that there is a strong correlation between acts of bestiality and the abuse of children. Because of this, those convicted of bestiality will be listed on the National Sex Offender Registry, protecting animals and other vulnerable members of our society, such as our children.

The third bill that has been passed is Bill C-68, the banning of shark finning. Shark finning is the act of removing fins from sharks while discarding the rest of the shark. They are often still alive when discarded, but soon drown because they are unable to swim without their fins.

Spreading Joy, One Tail Wag at a Time

Living in a community where the demographics of seniors is higher than the national average, I have witnessed first-hand the isolation and helplessness faced by many in our aging society. So, when I retired several years ago, I decided to get involved with Burlington Humane and introduce my four-legged companion to the joys of pet therapy. Many seniors, residing in retirement or nursing homes, find themselves separated from family and friends, no longer able to partake in the day-to-day activities that we take for granted. A few short minutes with a senior may not seem significant to those of us who live busy lives, but these cherished moments can put a smile on a senior's face or momentarily arrest their tears, as this short time together may in fact be the only interaction that they have all day.



My bichon frise, named Tulie (aka. Tulia Noor), was introduced as a therapy dog by her first birthday, following in the footsteps of her canine predecessor. Provided a pet has the appropriate temperament there will be a mutual benefit of such liaisons. 'Mutual benefit' being the caveat, since pets look forward to these visits as much as their target audience.

The profiles of most pet handlers are typically retired seniors themselves, who have the inclination to volunteer. One of my colleagues has offered her time to pet therapy for some thirty years; however, now at the age of eighty-eight, she is unsure how much longer she can continue. Replenishing those volunteer resources is a continual challenge, in an age where most individuals are torn between the demands of career and family. However, bear in mind that the commitment of one or two hours per month can result in unspeakable rewards to all concerned. Obviously, the highlight of a senior's day and a healthy interaction for the pet; but the simple donation of time to someone less fortunate is equally advantageous for the handler, who reaps the luxury of (even temporarily) being removed from his or her own life stressors and building new unexpected friendships.

OSPCA - Change in Responsibility

On March 4 the Ontario Society for the Protection of Cruelty to Animals (OSPCA) announced that it would no longer investigate and enforce animal cruelty laws when its current contract expired on April 1. The government requested that the OSPCA continue enforcing cruelty laws until the province passed new laws giving responsibility to police. The OSPCA offered a three-month extension. The role of the OSPCA came into question in early January when an Ontario court ruled the government erred when it gave the OSPCA policing powers without also imposing accountability and transparency standards. The OSPCA has admitted that ruling was the catalyst

to abdicating its role as it shifts its focus from enforcement to its shelter business.

In response, the province launched a 24 hour animal-cruelty hotline that residents can call if they have a complaint or make a report. Ontario's solicitor general has named a new chief inspector to oversee a temporary anti-cruelty enforcement regime. Residents can call 1-833-9ANIMAL with cruelty concerns. This is a temporary fix until the province can revamp the law. The government is expected to introduce legislation in the fall.

Ready for their Forever Home

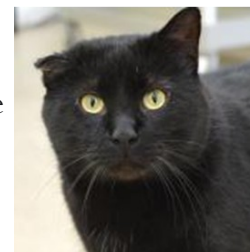
Bambi
